

# TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

# **Sexual Orientation**

Lesbian/ Gay: Person sexually and/or romantically attracted to people of the same gender as themselves

Bisexual: Person sexually and/or romantically attracted to two or more genders.

Pansexual: Person sexually and/or romantically attracted to others regardless of gender; all genders

Asexual/Aromantic: Person who doesn't experience sexual/romantic attraction.

# Gender

**Transgender:** Someone who does not identify with their gender assigned at birth

**Nonbinary:** Someone who doesn't fall strictly into the gender binary (the belief that there are only 2 gender identities).

Cisgender: Someone who identifies with their assigned gender at birth

\*Gender and sex are different and seperate from one another

Queer: This is a general term used to describe a person in the LGBT+ community, and can be applied to both sexuality and gender. This word is a reclaimed slur with a lot of complicated history - see article in Additional Resources if you want to learn more!

### **Pronouns**

- Common pronouns: he/him/his, she/her/hers, they/them/theirs
- Some people use a mixture of pronouns, such as he/they, or are comfortable with any pronoun
- Dictionaries (including Oxford and Webster) and style guides (including the Associated Press) say that "they" can be used as a singular pronoun for an individual
- Why is it important to respect people's pronouns?

# Coming Out and Outing


**Coming out** refers to LGBT+ people revealing their LGBT+ identity to anyone - family, friends, coworkers, and even those they've just met! LGBT+ often come out many times over the course of their lives.

Coming out is very personal, and for some it can be dangerous to come out to certain people in their lives.

**Outing** refers to revealing the LGBT+ identity of someone to another person. You should never out someone without their express permission

# Personal Stories





### Scenario #1

Your friend comes out to you as bisexual, how should you respond? How shouldn't you respond?

### Don't:

- Say "Cool, but.. I'm not into you, just saying"
- Invalidate their identity (ex. asking "Are you sure you're not just gay and confused?")
- Say bisexuality isn't real
- Tease them for it
- Refuse to be their friend
- Make a big scene about it (don't out them to anyone else!)

#### Do:

- Congratulate them for coming out
- Continue being friends with them the same as before they came out
- Tell them you are there to support them
- Don't make a big deal about it

# Scenario #2

Someone asks your gender non-conforming friend, why do you identify as something that doesn't exist in nature? Aren't the only genders male and female?

#### Don't:

- Agree with them
- Imply that identifying as non-binary/gender-fluid is something that isn't "real" or is a "life-style choice" to seem trendy

### Do:

- Correct their definition, explain that gender, like sexuality, is on a spectrum.
- Explain that gender is not binary and gender-nonconformity is common
